

I particurarly liked a piece called "Lunar Subway" which evoked a high tech hothouse atmosphere for saxophones and tapes souawked and scharped at each other through layers of lush, murky echo. On the subject of innovation through alteration, I recently received a tape from Italy that fascinates me more with each listening. I strongly dislike most minimalist music and feel that attempts to combine it with rock are even worse, although such a description would fit Marco Cacciamanti's cassette, Step. Rather than the stultifying rapture of Phillip Glass, however, Cacciamanti's musci is extremely energetic—to the point of hysteria at times. He also has an abrupt, even menacing sense of humor. In one piece, "War Kitchen (live texture)," he explores a territory that both improvisors and minimalists work with, but his approach is unique. Simple organ drones, occasional keyboard crashes and a repetitive rock beat are electronically modulated to produce strange undertones and overtones at the extremes of the frequency spectrum.
